I respectfully ask the Board to reaffirm its decision to put the name change issue on an advisory ballot, along with a rigorous analysis of the financial impacts of any change. Why? For three reasons

Dear Board Members:

I am writing to share two thoughts regarding the proposed Dixie name change.

**1. Honor the Previous Decision for a Community Vote.**

The board has already decided to allow the local citizens to vote on this issue. I would urge the board to deny the recent petitions, so the vote can proceed.

**2. Even Without a Community Vote, There Is No Need to Change the Name – If a Problem Truly Exists, There Is a Better Solution.**

The analytical framework for this conversation has gotten jumbled in the noise. There are really two questions being asked: (A) Is there a problem with the current name? (B) If so, what is the best solution?

**A. In My View, The Name Is Not a Problem that Needs to Be Solved.**

Personally, I don't believe there's a problem with the current name. To me, it does not refer to the southern Confederacy and its associated evils. Our family has observed much inclusiveness and kindness at Dixie Elementary and Miller Creek. Our schools put a huge premium on inclusiveness and social/emotional learning.

However, if we assume that "Dixie" is a racist reference and/or makes enough neighbors feel angst that it should be deemed a problem, then what should be done?

## **B. Even if the Name Is a Problem, a Name Change Is Not the Best Solution.**

Everyone has been assuming that changing the name is the only solution to a "name problem." That is not the case.

**I believe that the best solution is to keep the name, but also to institute a new, formal, ongoing, and continuous education program about the way that people of color have been marginalized for 400+ years in this country; the history in our country that has contributed to this marginalization; the day-to-day things that people can do right now to make our society better and more inclusive, etc.. We could start a social volunteer program where the students participate in an outreach day every year. On the first day of school, every year, one assembly topic could be the different interpretations of the Dixie name and the good/bad associated with those interpretations. We should continue our equity and inclusion committee, and our social-emotional learning programs. The Dixie name could be part of these trainings and conversations. Establishing this type of educational program is exactly within the School Board's purview.**

In a lot of ways, our Dixie conversation is like the clamor to remove southern monuments. What should society do? **If we sanitize the past, if we pretend it didn't happen, if we ignore history, then we're doomed to repeat it. Instead, let's shine a light on the good and the bad. Let's make it not just one teachable moment, but many, many teachable moments from Kindergarten through 8th grade.**

It may be helpful to watch this 60 Minutes segment (see link). A professor at the University of Richmond, Julian Hayter, gives his recommendation regarding the many Confederate monuments in Richmond, Virginia. He recommends keeping the monuments but also installing signs that accurately describe the history relating to those individuals. Professor Hayter happens to be black, so he can't be accused of racial insensitivity or white fragility. <https://www.cbsnews.com/news/60-minutes-the-history-and-future-of-confederate-monuments/>

For all these reasons, I respectfully request that the Board keep the Dixie name and deny the petitions that have been submitted. If the Board determines that the Dixie name is indeed a problem that needs to be solved, then I would urge the Board to institute the type of educational program described above instead of changing the name.

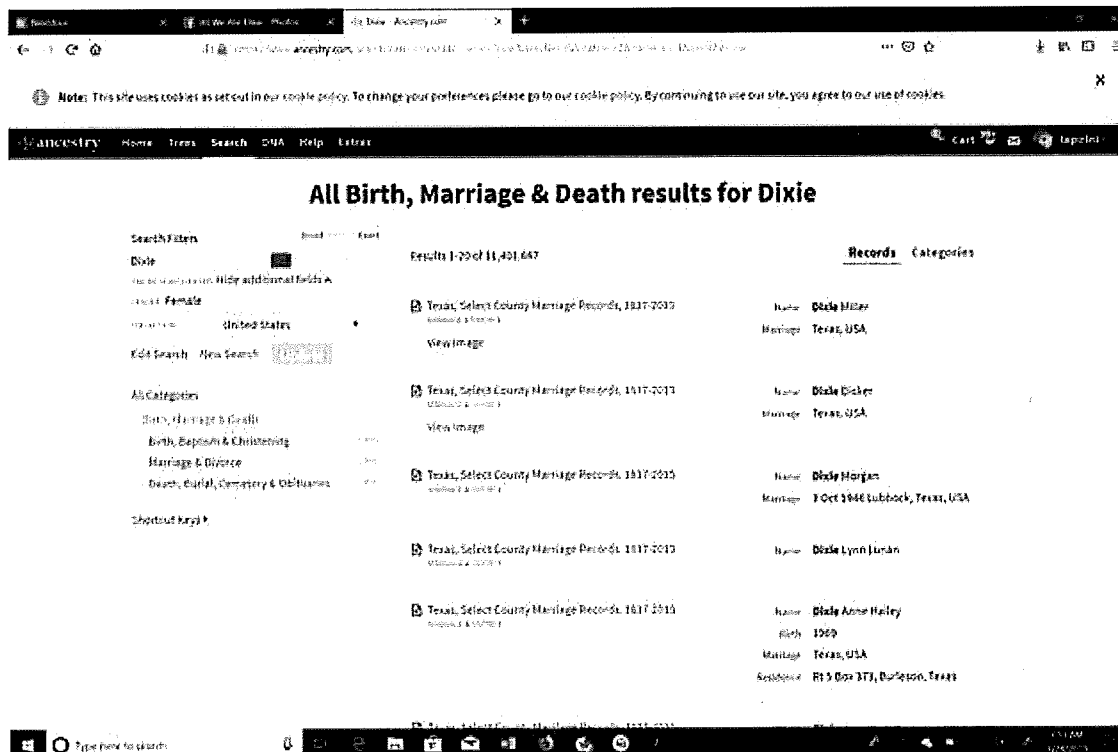
