Dear members of the school board,

I am a resident in the area covered by the Dixie School District. My daughter attended Mary Silvera and Miller Creek schools.

The name "Dixie" for a school district needs to be changed.

1. The name evokes the worst of all American history- slavery
2. Discussions of name change have brought the name and it's connotations to everyone's conscience now.
4. It is clear the name is deeply upsetting to members of our community, for good reason.
5. It is very poor to model hurtful behavior to others in front of our community's children.
6. Modeling hurtful behavior sends a message that it is ok to do so.
7. Schools struggle with bullying across our nation. Our local school district is no different in its struggles.

We are hurting our community's children by keeping the blatant racist name as our district name.

What a fantastic opportunity we have to:

1. Right a wrong
2. In the process model for our community children how to make amends, how to act kindly towards our neighbors, how to stand up for what is right and how to always keep an open mind to learning from others.

I have read objections that name change would rob money from programs like anti- bullying. Putting name change front and center would be a much more powerful, personal message and experience for our children.

My history:

1. As a fourth grader, the National media descended on my school, covering the first school district in the nation to voluntarily choose integration. This was done by busing African American children to upper middle class white schools (but not white children away from their communities). I learned a lot about prejudice at that time. I thought I understood predjudice then. I did not
2. I adopted my daughter, a baby of color. Watching how people treated her and us, I thought I understood predjudice. I did not.
3. I treated elder African Americans for PTSD from seeing family and neighbors lynched in the South. African Americans migrated to our area for more than jobs. Often they fled for their lives.

In trying to treat these neighbors of ours, I though I understood predjudice. I did not.

As a white person in this white dominant culture, I can only make a commitment to keep learning. I will never really understand color predjudice but I definitely understand predjudice based on sex.

Our local newspaper has recently reported on how 'white' our county is. There is much we tend to be blind to because we generally are in the dominant white culture. A name change is an excellent way to help us be in the real American world, encourage a more diverse population to join us here in Marin and enjoy what diversity can bring.

As a former student of the Dixie School District, I request that you change the name to one without the racist implications of the word 'Dixie'.

I remember a previous effort to change the name while I was a student. One teacher assigned the class a persuasive essay on the subject, and the class (including myself) overwhelmingly wanted to keep the current name. Our reasoning for this will sound familiar to anyone who has followed similar controversies regarding Confederate symbolism: this is part of our identity, it doesn't represent hate to us, changing it would bother me.

But just as in the case of flying the Confederate flag or displaying statues of Confederate leaders, this reasoning is flawed. These symbols, including the name "Dixie", are rightly associated with some of the most shameful aspects of this county's history. This history should not be forgotten, but neither should it be celebrated. The flags we fly, the statues we display, the names we call our institutions may seem inconsequential, but they signal to others what sort of people we are and what sort of society we want to live in. Please ensure that the school district you manage isn't sending the wrong signals.

Dear Dixie Board of Trustees,

I am writing to express my wholehearted support of changing the Dixie School District name. As I have expressed publicly already on Facebook, I don't believe the history controversy is relevant in the slightest to this conversation. Instead, to me, the only relevant question is - does the current name offend and diminish underrepresented members of our community and their children? We all know the answer - Yes! It does. And it has going back into the 1990s, if not even before that. For that reason alone, I urge you to vote to change the name.

My view is that the best and most viable name on the list of names suggested is Miller Creek Elementary School District. Not only is the name well-known in our community but it avoids the pitfalls of naming the district after a person or potentially controversial subject. Nearly every child and parent knows about Miller Creek and most of have played in it while at Marinwood Camp, enjoyed a concert in on the grass next to it, or explored it as a student at Miller Creek Middle School. It's known and loved by our community and it makes sense as a name.

I would be remiss to not say a few things about the dreaded word racism. I have been very distressed by the anger and defensiveness I see in our community on this issue and I don't think we are self-reflective enough when it comes to issues of race. I am of the mind that we will not be able to meaningfully discuss this issue as a community until we rethink the definition of racism. I think the book *White Fragility* has the best framework for this and I believe it should be mandatory reading for those of you with the power to make a vote here. According to the author, "the most effective adaptation of racism over time is the idea that racism is conscious bias held by mean people." This "good/bad binary," positing a world of evil racists and compassionate non-racists, is itself a racist construct, eliding systemic injustice and imbuing racism with such shattering moral meaning that white people, especially progressives, cannot bear to face their collusion in it." In other words, racism is not a conscious bias held by mean people, it is a deeply imbedded historical system of institutional power and *is unconscious*.

With this definition in mind, I am aware of and can accept the great historical and institutional benefit I enjoy being white and am therefore able to be more open-minded about the ways in which I unconsciously am racist or perpetuate racism. I also believe accepting and owning this is the first step in living an anti-racist life. I'm a work in progress on this and I imagine I will make many more mistakes in my words and actions going forward but I'm determined not to be defensive when confronted on this.

I also found this passage in the book to be profound and relevant to our community: "White progressives can be the most difficult for people of color because, to the degree we think we have arrived, we will put all of our energy into making sure that other see us as having arrived. None of our energy will go into what we need to be doing for the rest of our lives: engaging in ongoing self-awareness, continuing education, relationship building, and actual anti-racist practice. White progressives do indeed uphold and perpetuate racism, but our defensiveness and certitude make it virtually impossible to explain to us how we do so." Our Dixie community is so defensive when confronted with the possibility that racism exists around us or, god forbid, that we are participants in it, that we can't see, listen, or learn. Defensiveness is a textbook way for us to protect our racial bias while simultaneously affirming our identities as open-minded.

I believe until we truly rethink our definition of racism as a structure, as opposed to an event, we will not be able to discuss this issue in a real way and we won't ever be able to move towards being a truly inclusive community. Right now, our defensiveness and certitude at the mere mention of the word "racism" are making any meaningful discussion impossible and make inclusion a nice-sounding word, but not a reality for all.

I want to live in and for my kids to grow up in a TRULY inclusive community, not one that only includes white people on their terms. I see changing the Dixie name as an important first step in what I believe should be a continuing discussion in our community.

- Not to be outdone, Ms. Glickman's husband David Curtis cheered the vandalization of Dixie property and threatened members of the community at their homes. Dear Recipients:

I believe that a direct vote by the people concerned, on issues such as District name change, is the purest and most accurate form of democracy. With representative democracy, here epitomized by the Dixie School Board, our representatives are often subject to various pressures which may distort or impair perceptions of what their constituency desires. We are fortunate, however, that a prior Dixie School Board has provided the means and opportunity for most accurately determining the wishes of those who reside in the Dixie School District. This opportunity, to resolve the issue of District name change through a direct vote of the people, should not be denied.

Further, the Dixie community should be allowed to weigh in on any name change. Many individuals have affection for the name Dixie. Their views should not be given less consideration than the views of those who profess to be offended by the name. It has been stated that the impetus for a name change stems from a clamorous minority. A direct vote will reveal the numerical strength of those who advocate name change, and whether they are really a minority.

A name change implemented solely by the School Board would be perceived by many as caving in to political pressure. Caving in equates with weakness; not with strong leadership. The fitness of Board Members choosing to deny their constituency a direct vote in resolving the name change issue could well be called into question. Their motives would be suspect.

Thank you for serving on the Dixie District School Board and for your commitment to our community. Two years ago, our family moved to San Rafael from Alexandria, Virginia. We were thrilled to find a welcoming community at Mary Silveira Elementary School. Yet, we were puzzled as to why a school district in Marin County would be named the Dixie School District.

The only thing more unexpected than the Dixie name was learning that there was opposition to changing the name. Because the District prides itself on being an inclusive and progressive community, it is surprising that the name hasn't been changed during previous efforts to do so. Now that the Marin Community Foundation has offered to pay for the name change, cost is no longer an issue.

I have lived in the South and can say that there is nothing benign about "Dixie". Witnessing blatant racism was deeply unsettling. Sadly, the incidents are too numerous to recount. Because of these experiences, I cannot suspend the belief that our Dixie School District in San Rafael does not have any connection to the Southern Confederacy.

Keeping the name "Dixie" serves to honor the Confederacy, rather than recognizing its hateful and dark history. Further, it communicates the message that not all members of our community matter. Re-naming the district Live Oak Valley Elementary School District would not detract from the excellence of the district. Changing the name is the only way to eliminate the pain and confusion caused by "Dixie".

Dear Governing Board of Dixie School District,

The principle "First, do no harm" should not just apply to physicians who have taken the Hippocratic Oath. Our entire society would be better served if this tenet were adopted by other professions – especially politicians. As members of the Dixie School Board, I am hopeful you will "first, do no harm" when you decide whether to change our school district's name.

If the Board rules to not change the name, this issue will continue to fester. The umbrage of those genuinely offended by connotations of the word "Dixie" and the divisive tactics of those determined to shame Marin County for unrelated, perceived slights will escalate. The tone of on-line posts and the fact that local women opposed to the name change are being harassed by extremist elements of the "Change the Name" movement should give you a sense of where this debate is headed if decisive action is not taken.

If the Board rules to change the name, it risks erasing the Dixie School District's name-recognition as one of the top school districts in the state, a hard-earned reputation that has benefited local property values and students transferring to private schools. Changing the name will anger those concerned with the costs associated with the change, which will ultimately be borne by our children, since much-needed education funds will be diverted to cover the costs associated with the change. While the Marin Community Foundation has generously offered to pay approximately \$18,000 toward this effort, the estimate upon which the offer was based obviously did not include legal fees or address how the likely cost overruns would be handled. As someone who works with the legal community on construction projects that exceeded estimated budgets, I can assure you that the costs will exceed \$18K due to unanticipated items and the fact that attorneys routinely burn through \$18K in one week, let alone the months it would take to execute this change with all state and local agencies. At the January 15th meeting, I met the District's attorney from Lozano Smith – his time for that meeting alone must have cost \$1,500. Further, an entirely new name will likely anger those who believe the District is named after a Miwok woman (Mary Dixie) – such a change would be yet another in a long history of slights to Miwok-Americans.

The proposed ballot initiative in 2020 will only kick the can further down the road and based on the reported number of "We Are Dixie" supporters, is unlikely to result in a conclusion to our long, local nightmare. Do we really want to be dealing with this issue for two more years? If a name change is rejected by District voters, can you imagine ten more years of this insanity?

After reviewing the list of proposed names, there is only one option that will allow our community to put this fiasco behind us once and for all – change the name of the Dixie Elementary School to the **Mary Dixie Elementary School** and the Dixie Elementary School District to the **Mary Dixie Elementary School District**. Each of the other proposed names are problematic, and it is unfortunate that in the many years this issue has been pursued, this is the best the "Change the Name" movement could come up with. The other options: are used by other nearby schools and districts, which would create confusion and erode our district's reputation; honor individuals responsible for selecting the name "Dixie" (Miller) or those with yet to be discovered skeletons in their closet (Lucas); give preferential treatment to one of the three District communities; are not representative of our community; could create legal challenges over trademarked material; open the District to accusations of "Native mascotry" (a term coined by Jacqueline Keeler, a Navajo/Yankton Dakota Sioux) creating a new debate that numerous sports teams named after Native American tribes are currently having.

Naming the district and elementary school after Mary Dixie, a local Miwok woman, will end this controversy at minimal cost to the District and most importantly, it will **"do no harm."** The Mary Dixie name would represent a compromise – and true to a successful compromise, both sides may be unhappy with the result. However, based on the feedback received during my limited effort gathering petition signatures for the Mary Dixie option, the majority of District voters will be relieved that this matter has ended with minimal impact to funds dedicated to the education of our children while preserving the name-recognition benefits associated with our district's reputation for excellence.

As I informed the Board previously, I procured the MaryDixieSchoolDistrict.org and MaryDixieSchool.org domain names and will donate them to the District. Below are the steps I recommend for implementing the Mary Dixie name change:

1. The Board votes to adopt the new name (cost: \$0.00);
2. I transfer ownership of the domain names to the District (cost: \$0.00);
3. The District incorporates the new names into all e-mail communication signature blocks (cost: \$0.00 and 2-minutes of administrative time per employee);
4. The District transfers email and websites to the new domain addresses (2 hours of web administrator's time);
5. The District orders new supplies (e.g., letterhead) with the new name as existing supplies run out (\$0.00 in additional costs);
6. Change existing Dixie signage (\$0, since \$18K has been offered by the Marin Community Foundation, but a minimal expense since much signage could be altered to add the word "Mary");

7. Change the name with state and local agencies (\$TBD, but the unused balance of Marin Community Foundation funds could be used toward the legal fees required for this effort).

This approach will hopefully thread the needle of compromise (minimizing costs, preserving our district's name-recognition for excellence, honoring an historically mistreated minority group and removing the stigma associated with the word "Dixie"). The fact that this name was proposed by one of Mary Dixie's relatives at a recent school board meeting should ease any concerns over bestowing Mary Dixie with this honor.

Thank you for your attention to this matter and, on behalf of the community, I am sorry so much of your valuable time has been spent dealing with this issue. In closing, I remind you that whatever you decide, "first, do no harm". **The name "Mary Dixie" does no harm.**

A new name should be one that the community can say with pride "I go to school in the xxx" district." I hope that you vote to change the name to Live Oak Valley Elementary School District or LOVE School District for short. I imagine the first people those many years ago coming over the hills and spying our valley. Seeing the abundant live oaks with a bounty of acorns for food. Streams full of fish. The feeling they must have felt was akin to Love. The words they used to name the place may be gone by that feeling remains. Love is what we came here for. Love is the opening door. Please vote for LOVE. Live Oak Valley Elementary School District.

Why "Dixie" can't be dressed up and should be changed. While the origination of the name for the Dixie School District is rooted in honoring the antebellum south, that is not the only reason "Dixie" is an offensive name to me and many people of color.

The root of my trepidation in 1989 about delivering my six year old son to a school named Dixie began when I was young.

When I was young we watched TV on one of three channels at night. I have a strong memory of all three channels telling the story of a young black boy, Emmett Till, being beaten and killed when he visited Dixie. His crime- he looked a white woman in the eye. I vividly remember the image of his badly beaten body in my mother's JET magazine. Killed in Dixie.

I was 8.

For the next 10 years all manner of abuse was heaped on people that looked like me by people in Dixie. In Sacramento, California I was an interested observer.

I watched as people all over Dixie resisted Brown V Education by any means possible. It played out on those three channels. Beatings, Riots, School Closings. I watched as people that looked like me were denied lunch rooms, clean toilets, clean water fountains throughout Dixie.

I listened as Senator James Eastland told the world that segregation would never end in Dixie. Followed by a host of Governors standing in school house entrances throughout Dixie proclaiming "We are Dixie" and vowing that people who looked like me would never enter their schools.

I watched as people who looked like me were dragged out of lunch counters just for sitting on a stool in Dixie. Throughout Dixie the inevitable change was resisted and fought by those that wanted to keep Dixie,

Dixie.

There are many more images of Dixie formed those years. Dixie was not a place I ever wanted to be.

That is what drives me to change this name. No person should feel any trepidation about delivering their child to school because of a name.

No teacher should ever feel any trepidation about working for a school district because of a name. Has that happened here? A question to ask is why has there been only one african american teacher in the history of the school district? Has a form of external restrictive covenants (the name of the "district) put trepidation in the mind of the potential applicant? By the way, Branson has three African American teachers.

A name change is the right thing to do. Now is the right time to change it.

I am sending this via email in addition to through the online form. There's no receipt setup, so I thought it wise to send it this way too. I did not mean to submit two letters, but wanted to be sure to have my opinion registered.

For the record, I am a District Parent - 3 kids have been through the district, 1 still is at Miller Creek. I am writing to express my support for changing the name and encourage you to pick the Live Oak Elementary School District as our future name.

I don't envy you for the decision that is before you. You are hearing so much from so many people with such strong feelings, it's obviously a complex decision facing you.

I know my voice is one of many and probably all you will do is check off that I am for changing the name (and perhaps what name I'd prefer), but I will take a moment to offer my perspective. I won't belabor the history or the connotations of the name we have. You all have heard so much about this over the past months. I will say for me the history locally is murky at best and has enough of a credible story connecting it to the confederate south that historical motivations should argue for change. The strained linkages to Mary Dixie should be set aside (and in fact are a form of appropriation of their own). The argument that the name is associated with an unblemished history of tolerance and inclusivity is also ahistorical given that every school in California was segregated until the 1960s, and it's a given that this community faced challenges in the move towards integration like so many others everywhere. Once we move past our local history and address this in the context of our community today, we have to confront the reality that for some significant number of our community members this name is deeply and painfully associated with the worst side of America - a side that lives on in parts of America today.

So what do we do in the face of a murky history, a tarnished name, and the clear pain endured by members of our community? We change the name of course.

When fire strikes a community, do we say, "The fire didn't burn my home, so I'm not going to do anything?" When a flood ruins our neighbors home do we look the other way count our blessings? No, we reach out and lend a hand, because when some among us suffer while we are spared, we feel compassion and we try to ease their burden.

I look at the name change the same way. My family has no (known) slave history. I have not been called names or followed in stores, or harassed by cops for the color of my skin. So I can't fully know the pain this name causes, but I can see it on the face of my neighbors. Will I suffer any real pain if the name changes? Will anyone who adores the name? Not really, not substantially, and not comparably to the pain our neighbors feel. So let's change the name, ease the pain and move on.

Finally, I'll note that as a practical matter, this has come up 4 times in a formal way over 20 years. It is unlikely that if you vote no it will not come up again and will continue to be divisive in our community. Why would such an issue resurface time and time again? Because it's intensely painful to some members of our community while for the rest of the community it's a name (with positive or neutral connotations). When a minority of people in a community have to swim upstream against something so deeply painful it takes time to rally after any setback, but it should be clear that those of us who advocate change will continue to rally.

So please board members do what's right even if it's not popular today and change the name to something that doesn't hurt some of us and that over time we can all embrace.
