"Dear Superintendent Yamashiro and Members of the Board,

To help heal the deep divides in the school district, the process of selecting a new name can be turned into an opportunity to engage concerned communities in creating positive, new narratives.

At the risk of appearing naive or ill-informed, I want to outline a possible path forward, agreeable to a majority of interested parties. I see that every person may be able to access the healing power of love, especially in times of great crises that appear insurmountable. I believe People of good will on all sides of this seemingly intractable issue can find some threads of agreement, but only if the Board creates opportunities for all sides to find agreement, and makes decisions that promote rather than prevent agreement. Please consider with me: What are the decisive steps to make agreement possible?

First, the Board can see the writing on the wall. The weight of public opinion now favors a name change. The general public would be agreeable to many new names and is not attached to any name in particular. The general public wants a new name that reflects positive values, begins a new chapter and inspires new narratives. In contrast, the opponents of the name change are attached to one and only one name, which is highly divisive, and is clearly hurtful and hateful to many People. Is it possible for opponents of change to let go of their attachment to the old name with its negative narratives, and then embrace a new name with positive narratives?

One brief Community Dialog on February 6 is not nearly enough. The Community Dialog on February 6 is a welcome attempt to promote healing, but it is not nearly enough to address the deep divides that have developed. On February 6, only 75 minutes is being devoted to a wound that goes back to 1863!

I strongly urge the Board to consider initiating processes of community healing that are significantly more sophisticated, longer in duration, and broader in scope than the event on February 6. February 6 could be the start of long term healing processes based in deep education & deep dialog. We are at a ,Äúteachable moment,Äù that could be fully embraced, we are at a turning point that will define this school district for years and decades to come.

Please do not rush to decide.

Please consider slowing down the process of selecting a new name, bringing greater deliberation to the process, and organizing one or two more community events to get input from the broad community before selecting a final name. Please organize one or two more events that allow for engagement and input by students, parents, teachers and the public.

Please consider VOTING YES on MULTIPLE new names and then engaging the community to help the Board select from those multiple names. In the interest of helping the Board chart a healing course for the school district, I suggest that the Board can vote YES on multiple new names.


Voting YES on more than one new name is a way to slow down and bring greater deliberation to the selection process. Then the broad community of students, teachers, parents and other parties could be engaged in the process of selecting a new name.

The Board could specifically reach out to opponents of name change and invite their input.

This is perhaps the only way to get significant ,Äúbuy in,Äù from opponents of the change, the only way that opponents of the change will let go of the old and accept the new.


The goal is to engage the entire School District in new narratives, new stories that can inspire students, teachers, parents and community members going forward.

Dear Board Members,

I would like to start by thanking you for your dedication to the students of the Dixie District, and I realize the district name issue is not something you may have expected to be dealing with when entering your positions. It is unfortunate that you have been burdened with this, and I hope you are able to return all of your focus to matters we can all agree will benefit our students.

Before sharing my input on the name issue, I will provide some personal background, as I have heard it may help you in weighing the value of incoming comments.

I am a Marin County native. My family came to San Francisco in the 1840s. We have been in San Rafael since the early 1950s, owning and operating businesses in San Rafael ever since then and to present day. I have been a parent, homeowner and voter in the Dixie District going on 12 years. My child enjoyed 9 years in the Dixie District Schools. I am fair minded and free thinking in my approach to local politics; I voted for some of you. I volunteer in the school setting and community at large. For what it may be worth, I am close friends with individuals of varying color, race, ethnicity, religious background and political affiliation - There are multiple bi-racial relationships in my immediate family. I care immensely for the well-being of our community - This is my home, and may very likely be the home of future generations within my family.

I have done my due diligence and read through all statements of those on either side of this issue, as I do not believe my input would be as credible without first doing so. I have kept an open mind, and applied critical thinking in asking myself tough questions about the value of each point made. I understand the importance of considering complex factors at play on any given social issue. After much consideration, I cannot conclude that changing the current name is justified, and in fact I believe that doing so may actually have negative and unintended dangerous implications.

To preface my position, I will first say that not once in my life, specifically during the time my child spent in the Dixie Schools, had I ever heard a single negative statement made about the Dixie name from any one in my circle, whether it be from neighbors, other district parents, or business owners in the community. I have, however, heard countless positive associations made with the name; it has been held up as a symbol of community pride, synonymous with

excellence. I will also state that I am not against change in general so long as that change is proven to be beneficial. In this case, I believe change sends the wrong message and is fundamentally damaging, and I will attempt to share my reasoning going forward.

There are several reasons those who support keeping the name believe in their case. For me it comes down to one important matter: I do not want my child or future generations growing up in a 'bubble wrapped' society. Kindness, acceptance, tolerance -- These are all very important values to embody. The schools within the Dixie District have a beautiful approach to upholding such values through their monthly Life Skill lessons. However, we cannot expect our children to be resilient, self-sufficient, integrity driven members of society (i.e. using these previously learned Life Skills) if we grown ups protect them from "life" in general. Histrionic knee-jerk politics & political correctness have taken on a new life, especially with the advent of social media, and we need to honestly assess the societal consequences in allowing it to continue at the rate it currently does.

The idea of changing the Dixie name may on its surface appear to be a 'fix' for some, but the question then becomes, WHERE DOES IT END, and at what cost? Russian River? Indian Valley Road? How many landmarks have the word Devil in them? Death Valley? White Hill Middle School? Miller Creek Middle School, for that matter, considering the controversy surrounding Mr. Miller's alleged political leanings? Could I suggest, perhaps, that Ms. Glickman's name might be deemed offensive to some, in that it includes the word "man" and may promote 'toxic masculinity', which seems to be a new "issue" facing us today? To propose a name change to any of these may seem absurd, but then again, we are approaching new levels of absurdity with our undying need to 'safe space' the world around us.

There are endless examples in this country of names tied to streets, towns, monuments, businesses, etc. which could in effect be considered 'offensive' to anyone choosing to perceive them as such. At what point does the bubble wrap we are applying end up insulating us from actually living, feeling, experiencing life and sharing our actual values without having them forced upon us? At what point is freedom of thought replaced with mandated morality? At what point is our energy squandered on these futile 'fixes' when it should be spent in areas of actual, measurable value. We are teetering on the edge of a very slippery slope here, and changing the name only fuels the illogical notion that re-labeling the world around us will create a utopia where we are free from hardship or pain. The truth is that itch will never be fully scratched for proponents of movements like those wanting to change the name - There will always be something to single out, there will always be a new business or community to upturn.

The school district name may or may not have ties to the Confederate South. However, the word Dixie itself with regard to the South literally represents a geographical territory, not a specific ideology. Assigning it greater meaning in fact only perpetuates the idea that stereotyping is acceptable. Aren't we supposed to be teaching our kids not to stereotype? Our kids are literally being taught today to not assume genders, but with a name change to their district we would in effect be teaching them to assume all things

South are hateful. Are there citizens from the South who would take offense at the suggestion that their background is offensive? Does the band "The Dixie Chicks" (which is comprised of self-proclaimed progressives) need to change their name, which is confirmed to be based on a song about Dixieland? Wouldn't validating the name change crowd only further perpetuate the idea that all things "South" are bad? How is this promoting "unity"?

Those that I have talked to who support changing the name claim that they don't like the word Dixie because it is connected to, verbatim, "the racist South" - They have simplified it to that one notion, which directly infers that an entire area of our nation was or still is racist. Ideas repeated often enough end up believed, and the honest facts become skewed. Were racism and slavery a very real and ugly period in our nation's history (and the history of many other areas of the world)? Yes. Are there still racists today? Yes. Will changing our school district name reverse any of those facts? No.

There are over 13 million Google results when searching the term "political correctness gone too far" - The backlash is very real, and our community's outrage about this unnecessary effort to change the Dixie name is only a microcosm of a much larger frustration Americans are facing. It is time we reclaim common sense and own our responsibility as parents, teachers and community leaders to instill in our children the proper values without the heavy-handed and patronizing efforts of those wanting to parent all of us.

Those wanting the name change believe they are righteous in their mission, but they are in fact proposing a very superficial "fix" to a very complex issue, at a tremendous cost to the community, and with ripple effects which impact society at large. Our community has gone through enough with regard to this issue. Let us move on.

This is a very difficult issue to face, and I sincerely hope your time, energy, and budget may soon be re-focused on matters that directly impact every student in the district.

Thank you for your time, and for all that you do. I wish for each of you a smoother path going forward once this matter is resolved.

"Dear Trustees,  
In the name of kindness, please change the name of our school district. It does not matter where ,Dixie, came from, only that it is offensive and even hurtful to many. Keeping ,Dixie, in any form would also undercut national efforts to remove public symbols of the Confederacy, and of the slavery and Jim Crow for which it has always stood.

The origin of the name is irrelevant to the need for name change. We cannot erase history, nor should we try to. But whatever our curiosity about how our school district came by its name, the proper forum for the explanation is the site of the Dixie Schoolhouse, immutably listed on the National Register of Historic Places and now sitting on the front lawn of Miller Creek Middle School.

The need for a name change comes from the fact that, for most people, ,Dixie, evokes racism. It may be something of a challenge to help those for whom ,Dixie, is merely the benign name of their or their children,Äs school district, people who are not racist themselves and have trouble understanding how to square their benign perception of the name with what most people hear. However, we can hope that they will learn to empathize with those, especially people of color, who find the name offensive and hurtful. It would be unkind to keep the name ,Dixie., We should not be teaching our children unkindness.

We should join national efforts to remove public symbols of the Confederacy

We should also join in national efforts to remove all public symbols of the Confederacy, notably by removing Confederate monuments, names and flags from public spaces. See, for example, the following:

"Dear Dixie School Board,

When my family and I moved from Oakland to San Rafael in 2011, we were well acquainted with the neighborhood as we have had family members living in Terra Linda since 1961. Finding a safe school community that reinforced values of equity and inclusion was of utmost importance to us as we considered raising our children here. We are grateful for the alignment we've generally found in this regard during our daughters' enrollment at Vallecito Elementary School.

The resurfacing of the Dixie district name change has brought about important conversations, that I hope have helped us to better understand each other and build our community. Our community safety depends on being able to respectfully raise, discuss and make progress on issues such as this.

While it is true that the name Dixie represents our beloved school district, sadly the primary association with Dixie, broadly speaking, remains with the Confederate States of America (CSA). I encountered this again recently when I had a friend visiting from out of state. He noticed a bumper sticker with the words, "Dixie Youth" and shot me a look with his eyebrows raised. When I explained that Dixie was the name of our school district, he responded that his first guess as to what it referred to was a "David Duke, KKK youth organization." Of course, this is only one example, but I share it because the powerful association of Dixie with the CSA and racism is the exact opposite of what I wish our school district name would convey.

Our path ahead should be grounded in ways to build a more welcoming community and to actively turn away from the very things associated with the CSA that the word Dixie brings to mind for so many. The request to change the name is all the more important to consider at times when our country is so divided nationally, but as our local history shows, this request represents a longstanding tension regarding a school district name that, while beloved, has also consistently been confusing, hurtful, and alienating.

Together, we can do better. Changing the name of the district, sends the message that we are willing to evolve as necessary in order to live our values of equity, inclusion and community safety

" Dear Superintendent Yamashiro and Members of the Board,  
My name is [REDACTED]. My family has lived in San Rafael for more than 25 years. Two of our children went through Mary Silveira and Miller Creek schools in grades K-8 and I served on the Site Council at Mary Silveira between 2006-2009. Our family continues to support any effort to increase funding and resources for our schools. But today, we are more worried about the social and emotional health of our community than our home values or some unsubstantiated claims of local ,community history. Let me explain.

Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me. It is easy to see just how naive it was to believe this might impact any bully who wanted to hurt us with their taunts. We all know that words can hurt. What we don't want is for them to go on hurting us forever.

All the people of Marinwood, Lucas Valley, and Terra Linda must begin to realize, and learn and understand why the name of their school district is the problem.

More importantly, there is a large and growing faction of our community that is offended by the name and want it changed. I agree with one protestor (who has suffered greatly during the current school year because of this name) said at the last board meeting, because I believe the overwhelming White majority of our community does not have the right to say what the meaning and impact of this word is to them.

We cannot tell them it doesn't hurt. It does, and we all need to understand why, and we need to do something about it.

While the unnecessary pain and suffering of some inside and outside of our community is the primary issue here, let us also remember the facts. The name of our school district comes directly from sympathizers of the Confederate States of America and was intended to support the ideas of the Confederacy. Historically, politically, socially, and academically, there is complete and irrefutable, evidence linking the word ,Dixie, to the American ,Confederacy.

The Confederacy was a collection of American states that seceded from the United States of America for the expressed purpose of preserving, protecting, and defending slavery as their primary economic engine. Historians have documented more than 618,000 people who died in a great Civil War. A war fought specifically by the Confederacy to defend the right to hold slaves in America. There is no reasonable argument against this evidence.

During this year, is debate on the name, many people have given evidence to prove the word ,Dixie, is so inextricably connected with Confederate history that it cannot be disconnected, or seen in some ,modern, light that makes it shine without this horrifying history. I would add three truly modern stories: The first is about the many Southern Democrats who seceded from the Democratic party during the 1948 Presidential election. These Southern politicians formed a group they named ,Dixiecrats. The Dixiecrats were segregationist, and opposed to the ending of Jim Crow laws in America. They nominated a young Strom Thurmond for President who won 39 electoral votes. Thurmond is perhaps best known for giving the longest filibuster speech in US Senate history in order to defeat the Civil Rights Act of 1957.

The second story is about current research that shows a significant reduction in the use of the word ,Dixie, for business names in phone books in 100 cities all over the South over the past four decades. Further, the reduction in the use of the words Dixie, South, or Southern when looking in local phone books, is shown to be directly attributable to the population of African Americans in these towns. The people of the South are removing this name from their daily presence.

The final story is about political activist organizations who are now taking the matter into their own hands. They are finding and geocaching locations around the country that have Confederate monuments or have buildings and organizations with Confederate names or flags waving. The intention of these groups is to locate these places so individuals and groups can find them and ,modernize the location to better reflect their beliefs about American history and modern American culture.

It, is only a matter of time before one of these groups comes after our school district and school. In fact, the more times the words ,Confederate monuments, and ,Dixie, appear in the local and regional newspapers, the sooner these activists will arrive.

However, I still believe it is crucial for us all to understand that the history, as irrefutable as it is, actually matters less than what the people of the world believe and want today.

The division in our community does not come from the people who want to change the name. The name is what causes the division and we are trying to fix that problem. Those who want to keep the name are simply widening that gap. I believe history will show that any work over the years to delay, block, and resist these changes have been racist.

The current group of people who want to save the name believe ,the stakes are high, your home value, community history, and democratic principles are at risk.,À When did home values and community ,history become more important than taking care of citizens who are rightly offended by the name of our school and district and are currently facing what they see as the harassment and real hurt provided to them daily by the name?

We all know that words can hurt. But they can also stop hurting us if we take them out of our public lives.

As an 8th grade social science teacher in the San Francisco Unified School District, I teach in one of the most ethnically, culturally, and economically diverse classrooms in the Bay Area. More than 90% of my students are not white.

When I teach them about this issue I usually just let them read a few of the articles and letters to the editor of the Marin IJ along with some culturally relevant material covering the modern issue of Confederate Monuments around the country.

Then I ask them to do the same thing we do for almost every major issue we study. That is, think about the issue at hand, read the arguments presented, and take a side. Then I assign them to advocate for that position by creating a campaign poster, an editorial cartoon, or writing a letter to the editor. Each year for the past three years, over 95% of my students have called for changing the name. That, is over 300 students! I wish I could share with your their work because,

I believe, they represent the future of this country, and it is their notion of freedom, dignity, and respect that the majority of Americans fail to listen to, much less try to understand.

In 1965, Lyndon Johnson said in a speech before Congress: there is no Negro problem, there is no Southern problem, there is only an American problem. Just as Johnson said then, there is only an American problem today. What kind of America do we want to be? Do we want to be an America that only worries about home values for rich white people and their beliefs regarding the history of this country?

Or, would we rather be an America that truly believes that all people are created equal and have the right to liberty and happiness in their lives?

I, am hoping, for our community, it will be the latter. And we will agree to change the name of our district and school.

Do not wait, do not have an election. You must take responsibility for this issue and work toward a fix now. Start by changing the name of the district now. That is the best path to success and healing.

I support the Dixie Name Change because words matter. As a writer and former teacher, I tell my own kids this constantly. I back up my daughter, s English teacher when she circles the word thing, five times in two paragraphs and writes that this word choice didn't cut it. Because she is right. It doesn't matter if thing at the time, seemed a good choice. Thing in your head, might have meant neighborhood or community, or tradition. But it doesn't mean that to other people. Your intention in using a word, I tell my children, does not matter anywhere as much as how it is received.

My daughter, [REDACTED], an eighth grader at Miller Creek, has been on the receiving end of hateful words at school, some of the hate speech that you may have read about in the newspaper in December. And while I am not implying that our current district name is making students hurl hurtful language at each other, I do believe that keeping a district name that is genuinely hurtful to African-American people, even unintentionally, reinforces an idea that if you don't mean bad intent, it is okay to use words that hurt.

I doubt that, when confronted, students who used hate language admitted that they meant harm. Maybe it is true and maybe it is not that they didn't fathom the amount of pain their words could cause. But if there is even the slightest truth to these students assertions that they didn't think about those words \*that way\*, if we do believe that some students who have used homophobic language, as they did toward my daughter, and racist language, as they have toward other people's daughters and sons, did not intend harm with those words then we need to model, as a community, taking responsibility for \*words\*. If we won't stop using a word, Dixie, that has hurtful connotations, how really \*can\* we expect kids not to use. But that's not what I meant as justification for words of hate?

My first choice for a new name would be Miller Creek Elementary School District because the creek itself is an important and beautiful place for so many of our students. My second choice would be Miwok Hills Elementary School.

My husband and I moved to Terra Linda in 2017 and have been thrilled to be a part of this wonderful and inclusive community, especially since our son was born last summer. We have the most amazing neighbors and everyone we have met has been welcoming and kind. When we were house hunting, however, the name of the Dixie school district was something that made me hesitant about moving to Terra Linda. I was thrilled at the district's excellent reputation, but as a person of color, I find the name to be off-putting. I felt this way before hearing about any public controversy. Regardless of its origin in this particular case, the word "Dixie" unfortunately connotes racial oppression. I understand that no one likes change, but I am having a very hard time understanding anyone's resistance to this particular change. If the name makes rational people uncomfortable, changing it seems like a no-brainer to me. I have resided in the Dixie School District for over 21 years. I was one of the three chief petitioners on the petition to create the Terra Linda Unified School District in the early 2000's and was a signatory on the last name change petition.

My children are very successful graduates of the Dixie School District with [REDACTED] being an attorney with the Federal Communications Commission and [REDACTED] being a designer with a well regarded architecture firm in San Francisco and currently taking her tests to be a licensed architect. I believe that their success was shaped by the outstanding education they received in this District; it was not due to the name of the District.

The name change issue has been a divisive one for many years. I understand the desire of the Board to hope that this issue will be resolved by the emergence of a consensus. Unfortunately that will not happen as those on both sides of this issue have strongly held views. To wait for a consensus will mean that the resolution of this debate will only be delayed with continued divisiveness into the future. The demand for a change in the Dixie name will not go away just as the demand to remove confederate statutes and monuments representing slavery and racial oppression will not go away in other parts of our country.

The decision by the Board to submit the question of the name change to the voters provided that the election is privately funded was simply a decision to avoid the issue, cloaked in a misguided appearance of democracy. The money needed to hold an election is too great and will not be raised. The election will not happen but the demand for a change in the name of the District will continue to increase as I have witnessed in the many years I have resided in this community.

As Board members you were elected by our community to make difficult decisions like this one. Although it seems to me that the explanation by John Miller's granddaughter of how our District got its name is much more persuasive than the recent speculation that John Miller named the District after a woman in Mariposa for which there is no evidence that they ever met. But the historical origins of the Dixie name are in the end irrelevant.

We are being blind to reality to ignore the fact that the name Dixie is well-know in our country to represent the Confederacy, slavery, segregation and racial oppression. This past Fall I visited the incredible National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington DC and better understood how names and symbols have been cruelly used in our society to oppress and deny opportunities to our African American citizens. It is plainly wrong to continue to call our District Dixie without regard to what this name means to many in our community and in our society at large. The harm and disappointment to those who want to keep the name is minimal

compared to the harm and pain caused to those for whom the Dixie name strikes a raw nerve.

The argument that the proponents of the name change are outsiders is offensive to those of us who support the name change and have lived in this community for many years and have spent many hours and dollars supporting the District. It is important to listen to the many prominent local political and educational leaders who have called for the Dixie name to be changed. The failure this time to change the name will only make our community look foolish and detached from the real world to the discredit of our excellent teachers and administrators and to the detriment of our students.

Dear Members of the Board,

Before anything else, thank you for taking seriously the work before you when it comes to the education of our children, and for your work to date.

As an 11-year resident of Marinwood, a native of the Bay Area, and the parent of a first-grader at Mary E. Silveira Elementary, I can say our schools more than live up to their fine reputation. We are thrilled with the education our daughter is receiving.

The reason I'm writing you is our district's name: Dixie. While that name rung a bit odd to me when I moved here in 2008, it wasn't until I learned about past efforts to change it-and saw the divisive nature of "Dixie" on NextDoor-that I decided to support a change to something more reflective of our community and its values.

One of my preferred names, "Lucas Valley School District," has met the requirement for your consideration. I urge you to ratify it. While I live in Marinwood, and know others in our district don't live in Lucas Valley, the school district I grew up in was named for a neighboring community. That never bothered me. And, unlike "Dixie," which instantly fails the Google test, "Lucas Valley" is neutral, geographically specific, and carries with it fine associations.

My preferred name for the Dixie school-"Joseph Eichler Elementary" in honor of a celebrated architect who left an indelible mark on our community, and a developer who was ahead of his time in promoting equal access for homebuyers-isn't on your list. Fortunately, there are other good names before you.

What we cannot do is lose sight of the issue at hand. The unfortunate actions and statements of a relative few on either side of this debate cannot be allowed to distract us-nor can any misuse of this good cause for personal or political ambition. If bad actors must be dealt with, let us deal with them later, as the separate issue they are.

As for the primary arguments against changing the name, they are weak:

"Our district has a fine reputation despite its name, not because of it."

"Of course there are other, bigger issues; that doesn't mean this one is unimportant."

"The cost has been nullified, or largely nullified, by the MCF's offer-and surely there are others who would donate more than we already do to CanDo."

"Arguments about the origin of our district's name and its historical value are, ultimately, a distraction-not because either side is wrong but because conclusive evidence is elusive."

"[www.behindthename.com/name/dixie/comments](http://www.behindthename.com/name/dixie/comments) They didn't have a choice. We do."

I ask you to consider a simpler, more practical viewpoint: "Dixie" is clearly divisive in Marin, in 2019. One look at NextDoor is enough to see this. Too often, the arguments presented by 5-10 proponents of We Are Dixie can be summed up as shades of "They started it!" or "Look what I've/we've been called," or "Look how we've been victimized." Rarely have their arguments demonstrated concern for the experiences of others. They also fail to recognize the fact that the demographics of our area have been changing and will continue to do so, a key reason this issue hasn't gone away since 1997 and is unlikely to go away in 2021.

Do we really want to keep kicking this can down the road?

"Put it to a community wide vote," say some, which sounds fair and good-at least until you get past the price of a special ballot and consider its potential cost. As a taxpayer, I don't think the price is justifiable-and ongoing conflicts and distractions make waiting a non-starter. On the other hand, let's consider the potential cost if a majority who live here say they're just fine with a name that fails the Google test so miserably? What then will our message to the world be? How will this affect our community's credibility? Will others see no parallels between "this" Dixie and "that" Dixie?

Unlike some in We Are Dixie, I believe outside opinion matters. No neighborhood is an island, and others here in the Bay Area and this great nation are watching to see if our statement really will be: "Keeping the name 'Dixie' is more important to us, no matter what it symbolizes for some." That isn't a message I want to send. Do you?

I know there are intelligent, well-intentioned proponents of We Are Dixie. Some are friends, and I view all of them as neighbors. I respect them and value their input, but cannot agree with their position on this matter.



Now is the time to leave "Dixie" where it belongs, to the old schoolhouse and historical record. Now is the time to state that we understand names are important, that we know names should be well chosen to ensure all feel welcome in this great community we call home.

Despite ( and I would add- because of) the impacts of segregation in our county as evidenced by the 2017 race counts study which found Marin to be the most segregated racially disparate county in CA, I think we want our kids to develop empathy and take an active role in contributing to just, caring and safe communities for all of us We create accessibility for members of our community who are disabled based on these values, not on whether there are enough disabled students or teachers to warrant our care. In the same way, the ongoing harm done to African American community members cannot be quantified. We already have knowledge ( as evidenced by so many who have given public comments) of that harm. I truly believe we are a community who deeply cares, especially about our children, and that by renaming the school district with a name that really reflects our shared values, we can join with others in leading the way towards more justice and equity in Marin and join with the many other communities around the country that have chosen to divest themselves of symbols of the Confederate South.

It is for all the above reasons, that I am urging the Dixie school board to vote YES on the name change, and choose a petitioned name

that can represent our community. I do not support any name with Miwok in it, as local Indigenous leaders have expressed their disagreement with using Miwok as a school district name, or James Miller- who was originally responsible for naming the school district Dixie. Nor do I support Mary Dixie as a viable solution, as this name is based on a questionable historical narrative and continues to ( in using Dixie) to have a harmful impact. I DO support Live Oak Valley Elementary School District, and other names that reflect the natural beauty of our community.





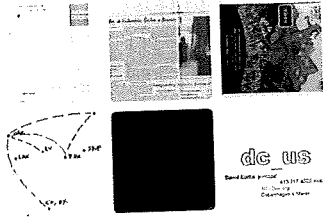

I am writing to you as a parent of a Dixie School District student.

Alisa Chacko should resign from the Dixie School District board of trustees.

She has violated her oath of office on multiple occasions.

1. She participated in both closed session and open session violations of the Brown act as documented in the recent letters from two attorneys by two different district members/Trustee.

She conspired with former Trustee Schott and Trustee Honsberger to delay potential efforts to legally change the name through petition, and brought forward a forced vote of a non-agendized item to require a public vote on the issue in two years. This action does nothing to prevent petitions. She is literally wasting everyone's time.

2. She has blocked for no legitimate reason, Trustee Glickman from having multiple agenda items during her service as a VP.

3. She has held committee meetings in violation of the Brown Act to block the effort to change the name of the district. This is documented in two attorney letters to the district that have been posted to the district website.

For the record, I am a District Parent - 3 kids have been through the district, 1 still is at Miller Creek. I am writing to express my support for changing the name and encourage you to pick the Live Oak Elementary School District as our future name.

I don't envy you for the decision that is before you. You are hearing so much from so many people with such strong feelings, it's obviously a complex decision facing you.

I know my voice is one of many and probably all you will do is check off that I am for changing the name (and perhaps what name I'd prefer), but I will take a moment to offer my perspective. I won't belabor the history or the connotations of the name we have. You all have heard so much about this over the past months. I will say for me the history locally is murky at best and has enough of a credible story connecting it to the confederate south that historical motivations should argue for change. The strained linkages to Mary Dixie should be set aside (and in fact are a form of appropriation of their own). The argument that the name is associated with an unblemished history of tolerance and inclusivity is also ahistorical given that every school in California was segregated until the 1960s, and it's a given that this community had some struggles in the move towards integration like so many others everywhere. Once we move past our local history and address this in the context of our community today, we have to confront the reality that for some significant number of our community members this name is deeply and painfully associated with the worst side of America - a side that lives on in many parts of America today.

So what do we do in the face of a murky history, a tarnished name, and the clear pain endured by members of our community? We change the name of course.

When fire strikes a community, do we say "the fire didn't burn my home, so I'm not going to do anything?" When a flood ruins our neighbors home do we look the other way count our blessings? No, we reach out and lend a hand, because when some among us suffer while we are spared, we feel compassion and try to ease their burdens.

I look at the name change the same way. My family has no (known) slave history. I have not been called names or followed in stores, or harassed by cops for the color of my skin. So I can't fully know the pain this name causes, but I can see it on the face of my neighbors, in their words. Will I suffer any real pain if the name changes? Will anyone who adores the name? Not really, not substantially, and not comparably to the pain our neighbors feel. So let's change the name, ease the pain and move on.

Finally, I'll note that as a practical matter, this has come up 4 times in a formal way over 20 years. It is unlikely that if you vote no it will not come up again and will continue to be divisive in our



community. Why would such an issue resurface time and time again? Because it's intensely painful to some members of our community while for the rest of the community it's a name (with positive or neutral connotations). When a minority of people in a community have to swim upstream against something so deeply painful it takes time to rally after any setback, but it should be clear that those of us who advocate change will continue to rally.

So please board members do what's right even if it's not popular today and change the name to something that doesn't hurt some of us and that over time we can all embrace.
